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






ELEVATION

✤ Our elevation ranges from 6200 to 8250'. Altitude sickness can occur so stay hydrated. You'll adjust in a day or so.

WI-FI

* Cell coverage is spotty, but free Wi-Fi is available at most hotels, restaurants and public buildings in Cortez, Dolores and Mancos. Mesa Verde National Park has service at Far View Lodge & Far View Terrace.

WHAT IS THE WEATHER LIKE?

* Weather in Mesa Verde Country is usually mild, however snowstorms can occur as late as May and as early as October. June through September are warm to hot, with cool evenings.



Average Sunny Days: 300+

Annual Precipitation: 13"

Average Snowfall: 42"

SPRING

* Everything's green! Services are beginning to open. Temps range from 50 to 70 degrees.

***** SUMMER

* Services are fully open and at its busiest. Find quieter areas of the Park by visiting the walking and hiking trails, Wetherill Mesa Loop, and National Monuments such as Hovenweep, Lowry, and Sand Canyon Pueblos. Drink plenty of water in warm months! Heat can be deadly for both animals and humans! Temps range from 85 to 95 degrees.

🐓 AUTUMN

* Fall is absolutely magical and the weather is perfect for exploring. Some dwellings and services close in November, but the leaves changing color, warm days and cool nights make it a perfect season for outdoor and cultural exploration. Temps range from 76 to 40 degrees.

ESSENTIALS



WINTER

(cross country) skiing, snowshoeing and walking. Winter trails will be available once there is enough snow. Temps range from 28 to 38 degrees.



HOW DO I PURCHASE MESA VERDE NATIONAL PARK **TOUR TICKETS?**

✤ Digital park entrance passes are available, as well as tour tickets.

▶ Visit www.recreation.gov to purchase these passes.

*Note: Once purchased, passes for Mesa Verde National Park must be printed or saved on your mobile device prior to use. Connectivity is limited or non-existent in the park, therefore printing the permit or saving it on your phone (so you can access it even if there is no wi-fi or cell service) is highly recommended.

✤ Tickets are available 14 days in advance, 8:00 am MST, on a rolling daily window. (For example, tickets for May 2nd will be available starting April 18th at 8:00 am MST. Tickets for May 16th will be available on May 2nd at 8:00 am MDT.)

• All tour tickets will be sold online or by calling 877-444-6777. Purchasing tickets in advance is strongly encouraged.

WILL I SEE WILD **ANIMALS?**

 Many animals are visible throughout Mesa Verde Country. Deer, elk, coyote, rabbits and even bear have been spotted. Farm animals such as cows, sheep, horses, chickens and goats are grazing in fields. Lizards are common sights in the desert areas. Less common are snakes, but they do live in the desert, so watch where you step.

ARE PETS ALLOWED?

There is a gated dog park in Cortez that offers lots of room to play and stretch. The dog water fountain is running most months.

* Pets are not allowed in the cliff dwellings at Mesa Verde National Park, but are in many of the National Monuments. Check before you visit, keep Fido on a leash, and pick up after your pet.

EV CHARGING STATION

✤ Yes! They are located at: Colorado Welcome Center, Main Street, Cortez - Boyle Park, on Grand Avenue, Mancos. There is also a Tesla Charging station in MVNP.

BLUE CORN MUFFINS

Recipe by Laurie and Rusty Hall The Farm Bistro, Cortez

Mix together dry ingredients:

- \gg 1/3 cup milled flax flour
- (Bob's Red Mill)
- ✤ 1/4 cup sugar

Mix above ingredients, then add to mixed wet ingredients.

Whisk together wet ingredients:

- ✤ 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- ✤ 1/4 cup mayo
- ✤ 1/4 cup honey (dissolved in hot water)
- ✤ 1/4 cup hot water

Bake at 350° for about 18 minutes in greased muffin pans.

*Tip: put a pan of hot water in oven while baking to increase fluffiness.

Yield: about 12 muffins

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

• TRAIL BIKING

600 miles of beginner, intermediate and challenging singletrack, climbs, sagebrush, slick rock and old growth forest trails make this the best kept secret in Colorado for biking.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW:

- ◆ 600 miles of green, blue and black singletrack, climbs, sagebrush, slick rock, and old growth forest trails.
- * Bicycle and e-assist rentals, equipment and repair are available.
- * Higher elevations of the mesas and mountain trails offer incredible views, and cooler temps.
- * Spring, summer, and fall are the best times to ride, but winter fat biking makes us a year-round biking adventure!

+ GREEN/BEGINNER:

- * Trust Loop (part of Phil's World, Cortez) is a great trail for beginners and those who just want a fun ride. The 3.5 mile singletrack loop offers a fun ride the whole family can enjoy. https://www.mtbproject.com/trail/4536821/trust-loop
- * Add Hippy Loop a nice loop off Trust loop to extend the mileage

* Boggy Draw - (Dolores) This is a great ride for those hot summer months. The old growth ponderosa forest of the San Juan National Forest keeps the trail mostly shaded and cooler than other local rides. E-bikes not allowed.

* This trail is 8.4 miles, generally smooth, and mostly singletrack, which makes a family friendly day! ▶ https://www.mtbproject.com/trail/4352303/boggy-draw-loop

+ **BLUE/INTERMEDIATE**:

* CHICKEN CREEK - (Mancos) - Chicken Creek Road, #385 is a great beginner route, and you can head off on the "out-and-back" loop from here. It's a nice doubletrack option to extend further up CC as long as time or energy allows.

* Phil's World - (Cortez): 26.8 miles of trails, 100% singletrack, e-bikes are allowed. One of the Bureau of Land Managements "Backyard to Back Country" treasures, "Roller coaster singletrack through the high desert of SW Colorado." — Jeff Fox

* Canyons of the Ancients loop 7.5 mile intermediatedifficult blue trail singletrack

* This is your trail if you like fun slightly techy singletrack, great scenery, and amazing cliff dwellings. The East Rock Creek Trail section is easy to moderate with a number of short, technical sections. Be on the watch for these sections. They are short and can easily be walked.

• ENDURANCE BIKING

Talk about lucky! Road cyclists can enjoy our hundreds of miles of scenic high-altitude drives and byways!

TRY THESE TRAILS OUT:

(Trail #155, San Juan National Forest)

- Starting elevation: 6,943 ft.
- Trail length: 8.9 miles one way
- Hiking level: easy to moderate
- Horses and mountain bikes are allowed on this trail

• Why it's cool: Trail follows the rim of McPhee Reservoir.

Can you see the Ghost Town beneath the water?

*** GEYSER SPRING TRAIL**

(#648, San Juan National Forest)

- Starting Elevation: 8,600 ft.
- Trail length: 1.3 miles one way
- Hiking level: moderate to difficult
- Why it's cool: Trail ends at a small pool fed by the only true geyser in the state of Colorado. No swimming allowed.

(#660, San Juan National Forest)

• 2.0 miles long. It begins at CO Hwy 145 and ends at Deadend. The trail is open for the following uses: Hiking, Horseback Riding.

*** THE BOX CANYON TRAIL**

(#617, San Juan National Forest)

• 6.5 miles long. It begins at Forest Road 561 (West Mancos Road) and ends at Forest Trail 621 (West Mancos Trail). The trail is open for the following uses: hiking, horseback riding and motorcycle trail riding.

• FISHING & BOATING

WATER, WILDLIFE, WOW!

McPhee Reservoir is the second largest body of water in Colorado! With over 50 miles of shoreline in piñon, juniper, and sagebrush country, this beautiful lake backs up to the San Juan National Forest and provides all kinds of opportunities for water sports. Rent a boat, paddleboard or pontoon, and add the wow to your stay!

*** MCPHEE RESERVOIR**

A large parking lot is next to a 6-lane concrete boat ramp that offers motorized-boating access, with restricted areas in wakeless zones. The reservoir is stocked with warm and cold water species of fish. Adjacent to the boat ramp is a trail up to a scenic overlook with 360-degree views and interpretive signs. The trail continues to the tent-camping area of McPhee Campground.

*** DOLORES RIVER**

Major tributaries offer good fishing for Rainbow, cutthroat and brown trout. Don't forget your gear and your license!

*** JACKSON GULCH RESERVOIR**

Excellent camping, boat ramp. The calm waters of the Jackson Gulch Reservoir provide great family-friendly fishing. Stocked with rainbow trout. Canoes, kayaks and wakeless boating (boats cannot create a wake here).

• WILDLIFE

Mesa Verde Country is a high desert region, so you will see desert animals as well as mountain type animals. Be on the look out for the Collared and sagebrush lizards, Mule Deer, sage grouse, prairie dogs, elk, coyotes, mountain lions, bats, snakes, turkeys and even bear.

● ALL TERRAIN VEHICLE (OHV/ATV)

There's no end to the experiences you can have! Check out some of the many trails designated for motorized use. Sideby-sides, motorcycles, and OHV's are welcomed on San Juan National Forest designated trails.

* ASPEN LOOP TRAIL

(Trail #631, San Juan National Forest)

A multipurpose trail constructed by the San Juan National Forest and the Four Corners Trail Club. The trail is open to OHV's, motorized trail bikes, horseback riders, hikers, and mountain bikers. This 39-mile loop trail was designated as an OHV trail to accommodate motorized recreation enthusiasts. The parking lot is designed as a turnaround to accommodate trailer parking.

BOGGY DRAW OHV TRAIL (#194)

The Boggy Draw OHV trail is 30 miles long. It begins at Forest Road 527 Boggy Draw Rd. and ends at Boggy Draw OHV. The trail is open for the following uses: Off Highway Vehicles (OHV) less than or equal to 50 inches wide. Check with the Dolores Public Lands Office for additional trails and routes.

*** WEST MANCOS TRAIL**

(#621, San Juan National Forest)

The West Mancos Trailhead is located adjacent to the Big Al Trail in the Transfer Recreation Area. Due to the steep nature of the upper portion of this trail, it can be very tricky in wet conditions and, if using this trail in early spring, be especially careful if you are on horseback. The West Mancos Trail continues upstream on the west side of the canyon before dropping to the West Mancos River level, then climbs steeply to Horsefly Flat, an open, grassy area. The trail ends at the Sharkstooth Trailhead, at the base of Hesperus Peak.

• CAMPING

Colorado was made for camping! Be sure and check with our local resource offices for developed (fee based) and dispersed (free) details.

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KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

This land really is your land. Learn about and respect the spaces we all own, share and sing about. Bring along reusable water bottles or hot drink tumblers to limit waste and stay hydrated in our dry climate.

STICK TO TRAILS

Even though shortcuts can be tempting, please don't take them. A few extra strides on the path will protect plants and the homes of the true locals.

LEAVE IT AS YOU FIND IT

Leave plants, rocks and historical items as you find them so others experience the joy of discovery. Any of our 750 different species of wildflowers will live forever in a photo. Snap away, but only with a camera. Treat all living things with respect. Carving or hacking plants and trees may kill or disfigure them.

TRASH THE TRASH

Pack it in... pack it out. 'Nuff said.

Be careful with fire! Colorado's low humidity has its perks, but can create dry, dangerous conditions. Keep campfires small and manageable to avoid sparking wildfires. Use care when smoking in Colorado's dry climate. Always put cigarettes out completely, and don't leave your butts behind.

KEEP WILDLIFE WILD

Colorado is home to thousands of furry, scaly and feathered creatures. To keep them - and you - safe, don't approach them.

Silence your cell phone before stepping into nature, and speak It is not adorable to feed wild animals. You could alter natural softly without using the speaker function. behaviors, exposing them to predators or even euthanasia.

Keep your furry buddies leashed when enjoying dog-friendly trails, and pack out their waste. All the way to a trashcan.

Share our trails & Parks. Chances are you're not out in nature to people watch, so try out the lesser-known paths and sites.

- Be considerate when passing others on the trails and yield to the uphill hiker and biker – they need the momentum.
- Listen to nature. Keep your voice and music soft so all can enjoy the peace of Colorado.



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LAMB WITH RED CHILE

• Original recipe courtesy of Pete Montaño

Start with two pounds of lamb stew meat, diced. Soak in salt water (1/4 cup of salt in a quart of water) for 8 hours; do not stir! Carefully drain and discard water.

Heat a Dutch oven over coals or in a hot oven. Starting hot is important!

Rinse the meat in very cold water, then brown the lamb in the oven. It should sizzle when the meat hits the metal. Keep all the drippings and broth.

Set the meat aside. Make a soft roux with flour and lard, Cook over a medium flame or glowing coals to a medium brown.

Take a 1/2 cup of red chile powder or flakes (Santa Cruz or Chimayo Red being our favorite) and add slowly to the roux. Add garlic (4 to 6 cloves) and onion (one medium).

Add hot water (about 4-5 cups) to the mixture and simmer. Add salt, a bay leaf and a dash of cumin as needed until everything is incorporated. Add the browned lamb. Cover and leave alone for a couple hours, heaping coals on the top of the Dutch oven or in a conventional oven at 350°-375°.

Stir thoroughly, add two potatoes and about four carrots, simmer until tender and serve.

*Tip: Make it over a campfire or in your kitchen.



MINI DIRECTORY:

» Mesa Verde National Park is open year-round, but some areas are seasonal. Face masks are required on NPS-administered lands where physical distancing cannot be maintained and in all NPS buildings and facilities. Canyons of the Ancients National Park (pg. 18) | Hovenweep National Park (pg. 18) Sand Canyon (pg. 19) | Lowry (pg. 19) | Ute Mountain Tribal Park (pg. 19)

Mesa Verde National Park was established in 1906 to preserve and interpret the archeological heritage of the Ancestral Pueblo people who made it their home for over 700 years, from 600 to 1300 CE. Today, the park protects nearly 5,000 known archeological sites, including 600 cliff dwellings. These sites are some of the most notable and best preserved in the United States.

While still farming the mesa tops, many began living in pueblos they built beneath the overhanging cliffs. The structures ranged in size from one-room storage areas to villages of more than 150 rooms. They continued to reside in the alcoves, repairing, remodeling, and constructing new rooms for nearly a century. By the late 1270s, the population began migrating south into present-day New Mexico and Arizona. Mesa Verde National Park preserves a spectacular reminder of this ancient culture.

• THINGS TO KNOW:

* Get oriented at the Visitor Center at the entrance. Guided tours of some of the dwellings must be purchased in advance. Visit www.recreation.gov to purchase your tickets up to two weeks in advance. Check for current safety conditions and protocols before visiting.

✤ Interpretive tours can also be purchased by visiting www.visitmesaverde.com

* Pets are allowed inside the Park, but are restricted in many areas. Be sure and check before you enter the Park for rules on bringing Fido. www.nps.gov/meve

* Allow 45-60 minutes to drive to the sites from the Visitor and Research area.

* As you travel into the Park, you will notice a change in elevation. Altitude sickness can occur, take it slow, and drink plenty of water.

* We are in a high desert region, which means very little rainfall annually. It can get hot and dry, don't forget to drink water!

* Hiking and climbing ladders in and out is a part of most cliff dwelling tours. Visit the mesa top sites for a less rigorous experience.

◆ Elevations in the Park range from 6,900 feet to 8,572 feet.

* Enjoy hiking, or traveling with your bicycle. Long House Loop is open seasonally, during the day for hiking and bicycle riding.

◆ Watch for wildlife – turkey, deer and bear are very common to see in the park.

Morefield Campground.

* Less crowded than Chapin Mesa with only biking and hiking trails, Wetherill Mesa offers a quiet setting to appreciate the archaeological sites and scenery.

* Visit the Chapin Mesa Museum inside the Park. Here exhibits and dioramas trace the lives of the Ancestral Pueblo people. Also available is a 25-minute Park video shown every half-hour and a museum store.

CULTURE & HERITAGE

* Wander Prater Ridge Trail, and try to decipher the art on the Petroglyph Trail, or discover the lushness of Spruce Canyon.

• EXPLORE THE PARK BY CAR *** MESA TOP LOOP ROAD**

A six-mile drive offering amazing canyon views. Learn about the Ancestral Puebloan people's occupation and architecture through time. There are 12 easily-accessible sites, including surface dwellings and cliff dwelling views. Highlights include Square Tower House, Sun Point Overlook, and views of Cliff Palace from Sun Point and Sun Temple stops. Overlooks also found on the six-mile (10 km) Cliff Palace Loop Road.

***** CEDAR TREE TOWER

Mesa Top Tower and Kiva and Ancestral Puebloan village can be viewed from the road.

*** FAR VIEW SITES COMPLEX**

Five Mesa Top Villages & Far View Reservoir Hike to see Far View House plus four other villages and a dry reservoir on a level 3/4-mile (1.2 km) unpaved trail.

• EXPLORE ON YOUR OWN:

*** BADGER HOUSE TRAIL**

Trail to Four Mesa Top Sites Journey through 600 years of prehistory. The 2.25 mile (3.6 km) round-trip trail through Badger House Community early mesa-top sites begins at Wetherill Mesa Kiosk.

*** STEP HOUSE**

Pithouse, Petroglyphs & Cliff Dwelling

This is one of the only alcove sites that contains evidence of both Basketmaker and Pueblo occupation. Total walking distance is about one mile (1.6 km) round-trip. Trail begins near the Wetherill Mesa Kiosk.

• EXPLORE WITH A GUIDE:

Cliff Palace and Long House can only be visited on a Ranger-guided tour.

✤ Tours can be strenuous. Due to high demand during the busy summer season, you may be asked to choose only one tour per day.

✤ Tour tickets for Cliff Palace and Long House must be purchased in person but can be purchased up to two weeks in advance online.

*** BALCONY HOUSE**

This cliff dwelling tour is not avaliable this year.

✤ CLIFF PALACE

Mesa Verde's Largest Cliff Dwelling

Please visit nps.gov/meve for current, detailed information on this tour for 2021. Please visit recreation.gov to purchase tour tickets. This one-hour, Ranger-guided tour involves climbing four 8-10ft. (2.6-3m) ladders on a 100ft (30m) vertical climb. Total walking distance is about 1/4-mile (.4km), round-trip. The tour begins at Cliff Palace Overlook, a 23-mile (37km), one-hour drive from the Visitor and Research Center.

*** LONG HOUSE**

Mesa Verde's Most In-Depth Tour

Please visit nps.gov/meve for current, detailed information on this tour for 2021. Please visit recreation.gov to purchase tour tickets. Start at Wetherill Mesa information kiosk for a two-hour Ranger-guided tour. This tour involves hiking at least 2.25 miles (3.6km) round-trip, and climbing two 15foot (4.5m) ladders within the site. The tour ends at the Long House trailhead, giving you a choice of returning to the kiosk or exploring more of Wetherill Mesa on your own. Allow about 2.5 hours (total) for tour and return to the kiosk.

CULTURE & HERITAG



* CANYONS OF THE ANCIENTS NATIONAL MONUMENT

At a whopping 176,000 acres, CANM has the highest known density of archaeological sites in the United States. More than 6,000 ancient sites have been identified, including villages, cliff dwellings, underground ceremonial chambers, and rock art. The Monument has been used or inhabited by humans for thousands of years, and continues to be used by humans today. Canyons was declared a National Monument in 2000.

• Did you know? Canyons of the Ancients is part of the Trail of the Ancients National Scenic Byway!

• THINGS TO KNOW:

- * Dog-friendly with a leash. Please pick up after your pet.
- ✤ BRING WATER with you in warm weather.

✤ Some sites in this "outdoor museum" are not apparent to the untrained eye, and precise locations are not publicized.

- Do not dig in the sites! Do not pick up artifacts! It is illegal to remove artifacts.
- ✤ Cell and wi-fi service are intermittent.
- ✤ Many roads are primitive and unpaved.
- ✤ Primitive camping is allowed in most areas.

• PUBLIC SITES YOU CAN VISIT WITHIN CANM:

*** CANM MUSEUM AND VISITORS CENTER**

This museum is also headquarters for Canyons of the Ancients National Monument, and is considered Southwest Colorado's premier displays of the culture and history of the Ancestral Puebloan (or Anasazi) people, and other Native tribes in the Four Corners region. The museum also displays methods that modern archaeologists use to reveal the past, and preserves artifacts and records from excavations in the Four Corners area. They also feature special rotating exhibits and events annually.

This museum is family-friendly and wheelchair-accessible, and also offers audio-captioned visuals, public restrooms and bus parking. Golden Pass and/or America the Beautiful Pass holders get in free. Don't miss the amazing views, picnic areas and two excavated sites on location, which are also wheelchair-accessible. Special docent tours are available seasonally.

Many of the exhibits are hands-on and interactive. You can weave on a Pueblo-style loom, grind corn into meal using a mano and metate, (which is an ancient grinding tool), examine the past through microscopes, handle real artifacts, or see how an early Pueblo household was furnished.

*** HOVENWEEP NATIONAL MONUMENT**

Hovenweep is the largest site to visit within CANM, and

was once home to over 2,500 people. This village was built between A.D. 1200 and 1300, and building similarities in architecture, masonry and pottery styles indicate Hovenweep inhabitants were closely associated with other groups living at Mesa Verde. Explore a variety of structures, including multistory towers, and learn about the people who planted and farmed this area long ago.

• THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT HNM:

« Admission is free.

✤ Do not use GPS to find your way to Hovenweep. Follow the directions from their webpage below.

 Hovenweep trails are open year-round, sunrise to sunset, depending on weather conditions.

✤ 31 tent campsites open year-round. Picnic tables and flush toilets are available.

* Don't miss Hovenweep Castle, and Square Tower.

◆ Square Tower is the most accessible of the five sites within Hovenweep.

✤ Bring your hiking shoes for some really wonderful trails to hike.

✤ Be aware that cell service can be intermittent.

✤ Pets on a leash are allowed on the trails. Please pick up after your pet.

• MORE CULTURE, HISTORY

LOWRY PUEBLO

The only developed recreation site within the Monument. It has standing walls that have been stabilized, 40 rooms, eight kivas and a Great Kiva - underground ceremonial chamber. The picnic area, restroom, and trail are all wheelchair-accessible. There is no water or phone service.

SAND CANYON TRAIL

A 6.5-mile long trail, and is used for hiking and mountain biking. It is one of the largest prehistoric settlements in this region, and has 420 rooms, 100 kivas, and 14 towers, but no exposed walls. Sand Canyon Pueblo is adjacent to the upper (north) trailhead for Sand Canyon. There is a small parking area, but no water, restroom, phone or wheelchair-access.


*** UTE MOUNTAIN TRIBAL PARK**

The 13 Ute Bands are the oldest residents of Colorado, and historically roamed throughout Colorado, Utah, and New

Mexico as hunter-gatherer societies. The separate bands moved with the seasons for the best hunting and harvest. The present-day Weenuche Band live in the communities of Towaoc and White Mesa to the west in Utah. This thriving Band celebrates the Bear Dance and Sun Dance every year, which connect old ways with the new in rich colorful pageantry of song and dance. The Bear Dance celebration is open to the public.

• DON'T MISS:

*** THE UTE MOUNTAIN TRIBAL PARK**

An in-depth experience not to be missed. Knowledgeable Ute Tribal Guides will lead you on an incredible adventure, while they interpret tribal culture, pictographs, cliff dwellings, surface ruins and artifacts. Half-day (easy) tours will visit Ancestral Pueblo petroglyphs, scenic lands, pictographs panels, geological land formations, and surface sites. full-day (active) tours involve a three-mile walk on unpaved trails and a climb of five ladders to visit four well preserved canyon cliff dwellings in Lion Canyon. A round trip drive on gravel and dirt roads of roughly 80 miles on the full day, and 40 miles for the half-day tours.

* NOTAH DINEH TRADING CO. & MUSEUM


This trading company was established in 1961 and features the largest collection of Navajo rugs, jewelry and Native American arts & crafts in the Four Corners. Trading posts are a time-honored tradition of working with American Indian artists, and still exist throughout the Southwest. The free museum displays a wonderful collection of antique weavings, and other treasures.

*** THE FOUR CORNERS MONUMENT**

This is the only place in the United States where four states intersect at one point: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. The nearest town for services and accommodations is Cortez, Colorado roughly 38 miles away.

The original marker erected in 1912 was a simple cement pad, but has since been redone in granite and brass. The Visitor Center is open year-round, and features a Demonstration Center with Navajo artisans. Navajo vendors sell handmade jewelry, crafts and traditional Navajo foods nearby. Picnic tables and

(Bonus: not only is the Anasazi Heritage Center a museum, it's also the visitor center for Canyons of the Ancients National Monument - think Mesa Verde but more rugged!)

Mine the treasures of historic Dolores, home of the Rio Grande Southern Museum, depot and Galloping Goose No. 5, which played a major role in Colorado's rich mining history.

Go standup paddleboarding at McPhee Reservoir, or try kayaking, fishing, boating, or hiking, which are also great options for a day on the lake with incredible views.

Visit Hovenweep National Monument. Marvel at the towers and differently shaped dwellings. Friendly Visitor Center staff are happy to share information on these mysterious structures and their purpose.

Shopaholics rejoice with the Mancos Creative Art District. Meet artists, galleries and shops to purchase leather goods, showpiece jewelry, western art and antique treasures. Area trading posts feature Native American pottery, hand-woven rugs, baskets, and artwork unique to the Four Corners region.



CALABACITAS • Recipe by Leann Hill

Ingredients:

tbsp butter
 tbsp olive oil
 cup finely chopped onion
 tsp minced garlic
 cup cubed yellow summer squash
 cup cubed green zucchini squash
 cup cubed Calabacita squash (striped squash)
 1/2 cup thinly sliced green onions
 cup corn (fresh is best)
 2 cup roasted, chopped green chile, hot or mild
 tsp salt, to taste
 cup seeded and diced ripe tomato
 a cup coarsely chopped fresh cilantro

Heat butter and olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high.

Sauté onion for about two minutes. Add garlic and continue cooking for two minutes, stirring frequently.

Add squash and cook for four minutes.

Add green onions, corn and chile, and cook for two minutes.

Season with salt and add tomato and cilantro. Cook for two minutes and serve.
